This technology allows children with various disabilities to complete everyday tasks and better interact with adults.

# Post Anesthesia Care Unit and Endoscopy\*

## Speakers for music therapy | \$304 grant

Music therapy relieves stress, improves patient satisfaction and provides analgesia, decreasing the use of pain medications.

Each classroom is equipped with a thermometer to help determine if a child needs to visit the nurse's office for care.

On March 13, 2020, we took our parents (Donna and Steve Nichols) out of their senior apartment and moved them into our house in Plymouth. Our timing was early, and a bit of a surprise to our parents. Due to their underlying health issues at 87 and 88 years old, we knew that COVID-19 would not be kind to them.

When we heard about organizations asking for homemade masks, we knew this was something we could do as a family. Dad carefully cuts the elastic to the correct length. Mom sews the masks from the fabric I have cut. New fabric arrives weekly – giving us something to look forward to. We love the pictures of friends and health care workers wearing the masks. It gives us joy to see that we are making a tiny difference.

My sister, Dr. Stacy Nichols, works for Hutchinson Health. She told us the Foundation was collecting masks for use in non-patient-facing positions and for people entering nursing homes. We were honored to be able to support such a wonderful organization, and one that is so close to our hearts – part of the family. Supporting Stacy made us proud.

We enjoy seeing the piles of masks grow and have a sense of accomplishment when we can ship them out. But, the most joy is seeing a picture of someone actually wearing the mask.

When you give a part of yourself to a worthy organization, you get it back tenfold. During these tumultuous times, you need to lend a hand any way you can. There is distance between us, but there is no lack of unity in our fight to overcome this and become a stronger nation.

# Our colleagues at Hutchinson Health

In the last two years, our team members contributed \$92,000 towards building the new inpatient unit that opened in 2020. This expansion doubled the size of patient rooms and added more than 17,000 square feet of space. During the 2020 One Campaign, our employees donated more than \$51,000.
