Park Nicollet Foundation started investing in community health solutions in 1996 with the opening of our first school-based children’s health clinic, the St. Louis Park Central Clinic.

Thanks to donors and partners, we continue to provide no-fee medical care, mental health, dental, prescription support, insurance navigation, and more to children and youth in communities with high need and few health resources available. Our four school-based locations include: Brooklyn Center High School, Burnsville Diamondhead Clinic, Richfield High School and St. Louis Park Central Clinic.



Better health of children and families strengthens quality of life and healthier outcomes. Graduation rates go up, highly mobile families settle in, teenage pregnancy and suicide rates decrease, parents are less stressed and anxious, and families no longer access high-cost emergency room care for routine health issues.
