



^{*}As our programs access their funds, the use of monies from the funds are shown as expenditures to the foundation for programs such as PowerUp, Hospice, Prescription Assistance, Diabetes Education. There will not always be corresponding revenue to offset the expenses because the dollars in the funds may have been reported as revenue that was fundraised in previous fiscal years. In 2021 we have a revenue surplus due to capital funds received for our Cancer Care expansion of \$1 million and donations for two new ambulances to replace those that were subject to excessive mileage during the pandemic totaling \$594,000. The overall 2021 surplus was \$953,433.

Donor spotlight

Answering the call, addressing the need

Mary Gillespie is an advocate and a champion for several causes in our community. She has been blessed with the resources to aid those less fortunate and feels we all have an obligation as members of this community to ensure and sustain a good quality of living in the St Croix Valley.

When Mary was invited to support Lakeview's request for the purchase of a new ambulance – she answered the call.

Her late husband (and former board member), Jim, was a "car guy," and providing a gift to help purchase a vehicle was something that Mary believes he would have enthusiastically supported. For Mary it was an easy decision – a gift from them both.

"A strong, well-maintained emergency medical service is an asset in our community and one that impacts us all. Everyone benefits," she said.

How does giving make Mary feel? "It gives me pleasure – I am happy to help," she said. "I am fortunate to live in the St. Croix Valley. There are needs in our community, and how we respond reflects on us as a community. Hopefully, each of us in our own way can do something to help maintain a good quality of life for everyone here for years to come."

With the generosity of donors like Mary, we have every confidence Lakeview will be there for those who need us most. We're grateful and blessed to have her support.

Program spotlight

Cancer Care

The Cancer Care Fund invests in equipment, support staff and facilities that enhance cancer patients' journey. The fund provided a new social worker and supports a patient support group for Cancer Care and Breast Health Center patients. 2021 expenses were \$85,819.

COVID-19 Response and Relief Fund

The fund purchased ambulance equipment to help COVID-19 patients during ambulance transport from their home or between hospitals. The fund also provided support to our front-line staff as they care for COVID patients in our community. 2021 expenses totaled \$20,590.

Diabetes education

Diabetes education participation increased to 192 patients in 2021 for those with no insurance or limited coverage. This was a 126% increase over 2020. We provided \$50,573 in educational support to patients. We offered video and phone appointments and virtual classes. Our participant satisfaction survey results are among the highest percentile at 93%.

Emergency Medical Services

Lakeview EMS is the primary EMS provider for an area spanning more than 350 square miles. Our Tactical Emergency Medicine medics deploy with the Washington County SWAT team, and now, St. Croix County, Wis. Lakeview EMS provides medical support at times for over 365,000 residents. Donations raised from the community funded the purchase of two new ambulances, which were placed in service to meet a fall/winter surge in COVID-19 patients. Lakeview EMS responded to 11,967 calls for service last year. 2021 EMS fund expenses were \$9,759.

Greatest Needs

The Greatest Need fund supports areas of highest priority for the Hospital, including facility enhancements, medical technology upgrades, and advancing specialty excellence areas. The 2021 support included transportation, durable medical equipment and emergency clothing. In addition, the fund also supports vital health care programs that insurance does not cover. In 2021 fund expenses totaled \$21,156.

Homecare, Hospice, Palliative Care

Lakeview's Homecare, Hospice and Palliative Care program provides convenient, cost-effective home care and hospice services to residents of the St. Croix Valley and Western Wisconsin. We serve patients' medical, emotional, spiritual and psychological needs. Fortynine volunteers dedicated over 377 hours in 2021; 39 patients received charity care; and the program fund had expenses of \$482,976.

Prescription Assistance Program

Last year, we provided or subsidized 802 prescriptions for 198 patients needing assistance to afford their medications – saving them more than \$35,700 in out-of-pocket prescription costs. The number of medications provided through this program increased to 802, over 522 in 2021, a 53 percent increase. Fund expenses in 2021 were \$63,722.

St. Croix Valley Faith Community Nurse Program

This is a partnership between Lakeview Health and local congregations. Last year, the program nurses provided 767 one-on-one contacts and 677 group contacts; made 717 referrals to church and community resources; and supported clients with social isolation due to COVID-19. The program launched foot care clinics in 2021. The program had \$227,821 of expenditures.

Program spotlight

PowerUp

In 2021, PowerUp worked hard to help kids and families have fun eating better, moving more and feeling good, with a strong commitment to health equity. Developing programs, classes and resources that are inclusive, diverse and welcoming for all kids, families and community remained a priority. Another focus in 2021 was to build upon our resources.

2021 highlights

- Reached 78,000+ virtually, through classes, events, website and e-newsletters.
- Reached 41,000+ with the PowerUp Press Family Newsletters.
- Powered Up 8,000 students with the PowerUp School Challenge across 24 schools.
- Engaged 4,100 kids and family members through 20 outdoor summer events.
- Created two live virtual kids cooking classes and two cooking videos with Cooks of Crocus Hill.
- Launched two family magazines with fun activities to move more and feel good (powerup4kids.org/familymagazine).

In 2022, PowerUp will continue to adapt our programs to increase access for a broader geography and diverse communities.





Make It OK

In 2022, Make It OK celebrates 10 years of working to help end the stigma of mental illnesses.

It's been hard to digest just how much the world has changed since January 2020. Despite the many challenges, our Make It OK team, ambassadors and community partners continued to band together to mobilize this important work.

In 2021, Make It OK reached thousands through virtual and in-person events, trainings, presentations, messaging, and our network of ambassadors and community partners. We also learned a lot. Mental health rose to a top priority in the 2021 Community Health Needs Assessments, reaffirming the importance of Make It OK. Fighting stigma and creating caring communities are a key part of that priority. We continue to see progress in stigma reduction, and there is more work to do.

2021 highlights

- 270+ trained as Make It OK Ambassadors through 17 virtual trainings.
- 630+ reached through 32 virtual presentations.
- 1500+ engaged in Make It OK through seven outdoor summer events.
- 1500+ walked (virtually) in the NAMI (National Alliance of Mental Illness) Minnesota Walk.
- Launched refreshed messaging and resources into trainings, website and online toolkit.

This year, we're developing new strategies and partnerships to ensure we are reducing stigma in our entire community, with a priority on reaching those most vulnerable and reluctant to seek mental health care.
