

## **HSA/FSA Qualified and Nonqualified Medical Expenses**

Below is a partial list of medical expenses you can have reimbursed through your HSA or medical FSA, including services incurred by you or your eligible dependents for the diagnosis, treatment or prevention of disease, or for the amounts you pay for transportation to get medical care.

In general, deductions allowed for medical expenses on your federal income tax, according to the Internal Revenue Code Section 213 (d), may be reimbursed through your HSA or FSA.

It is possible that changes in the IRS rules can affect qualified and/or nonqualified expense categories.
